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5-Day Lesson Sequence for CCSS W.4.1a

Day 1: Understanding Opinions and Facts

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Day 5: Writing a Strong Introduction and Opinion Statement**Learning Objective:**

Students will write a clear introduction with a strong opinion statement.

Key Vocabulary:

Introduction, thesis, opening sentence

Activity:

- Students draft a full introduction, including their opinion statement.
- Peer feedback: Exchange and check if the introduction is clear and engaging.

Check for Understanding:

Students self-assess using a checklist (Does my introduction include a topic? Does it clearly state my opinion?).

Differentiation:

- **Support:** Provide a model introduction to reference.
- **Extension:** Have students revise their introductions to make them more engaging.
